One of JB Priestley's best known works for stage, 'An Inspector Calls' is a classic of mid-20th century English theatre. These four clips study key aspects of the play.

### Context and Background

Set in 1912, the play unfolds during turbulent times in Britain as workers formed unions, and demanded better wages and conditions. This clip explores class divisions at the time, as well as the context of the play's first London performance in 1945. 


## Water Supply and Management


## Water in the UK



## Britain's Health through History

Knowledge and understanding of the world progressed significantly between the 13th and 21st centuries. This series examines how this progression affected health, medicine and treatment of disease in Britain.

### Health in Early Modern Britain

Between 1500 and 1700, people's understanding of disease and medicine progressed. New approaches, particularly the scientific method, led to significant changes, including identifying how blood flowed around the body and the classification of diseases. However, elements of superstition and religious beliefs still prevailed in diagnoses and treatments. This programme explores this period in Britain's medical history and is an excellent resource for GCSE history students.

## Health in Industrial Britain

## Health in Medieval Britain
